Spring 2008 Course Offerings

Associate in Arts

MATC's Associate in Arts courses are equivalent to the general education/liberal arts and sciences requirements for freshmen and sophomores enrolled in many bachelor's degree programs at four-year colleges and universities. With planning, these courses will allow students to enter a four-year degree program with junior standing. The final decision, however, is made by the accepting institution. Cost per 3 credit course \$325 and 4 credit course \$425.

MATC is offering participants from TLN subscribing sites a Certificate in General Education for the first 22 required credits in the Associate in Arts program.

Econ 201 Principles of Microeconomics (3 credits)

This course covers the following topics: price mechanisms, price determination in the products and factors markets, analysis of market structures, business decisions with regard to cost analysis, output determinations, and employing factors of production. Other topics such as regulation vs. deregulation, international trade, and economic development will also be discussed.

Psych 231 Introductory Psychology (3 credits)

This contemporary survey course presents the basic theory, concepts and methods being used in scientific psychology today. Selected topics include methodology, physiological psychology, development, motivation and emotion.

Speech 201 (3 credits)

The purpose of this course is the development of speaking skills. Stress is placed upon speech content, organization and delivery. Growth in poise and confidence is a major goal of this course

Eng 202 English 2 (3 credits)

The intent is to give students further training in composition and to increase their understanding and appreciation of the genres through analyzing and writing about fiction, drama, and poetry. Major attention is also given to the preparation and writing of the research paper.

Prerequisite: Eng 201

FLang 211 Spanish 1 (4 credits)

This course is designed to give you a strong base in the Spanish language and an increased awareness of the cultural perspectives offered. The video series students will use, entitled *Destinos*, is used across the country in many colleges and universities. Its popularity is directly attributed to the tremendous success it has had in helping students learn Spanish. The use of the text, videos, assignments and assessments will allow students to develop skills in beginning level Spanish.

SocSci 201 Introduction to Ethical Issues (3 credits)

Introduction to Ethical Issues is a course that surveys the range of theories and principles that are relevant in ethical discussion and debate today. Thoughtful exploration and examination will address the range of moral views and approaches that are pertinent to ethical dilemmas in both personal and public life, and from community or local interest to the larger world-view.

NatSci 220 Introduction to Nutrition (3 credits)

This course is an introductory experience in human nutrition. It is designed to satisfy basic nutritional course requirements for college students entering allied health programs and provide practical and interesting nutritional information for non-health majors as well. This course provides correct, scientifically-based information needed to answer basic questions related to nutrition.

Certificate in Hotel/Hospitality Management

This certificate will lay the foundation for entry-level supervisory employment in the hotel/hospitality industry. Cost per 3 credit course \$325. Classes in this program include:

Introduction to Hospitality and Tourism - 3 Credits

Introduction to Hotel Sales and Marketing - 3 Credits

Customer Service Management - 3 Credits

Hospitality and Tourism Law - 3 Credits

Meeting and Convention Planning - 3 Credits

Trvl151 Introduction to Hospitality and Tourism (3 credits)

This course provides a general orientation of Hotel, Hospitality & Tourism management. Students will learn basic terminologies and language of the hospitality and tourism industry. Students will explore the career opportunities in the lodging and tourism industries. Emphasis on the relationship and future business of tourism and lodging industry will be explored.

Trvl 178 Meeting and Convention Planning (3 credits)

This course introduces students to the business of event planning. Students will understand what it takes to be a successful meetings planner. Course content includes the study of planning, marketing, and negotiations with the hotel.
